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Session 1 – Faith on Fire in Corinth

Welcome to Corinth

Imagine stepping off a ship into a city louder and flashier than Las Vegas, more crowded than New York, and as diverse as TikTok's For You page. You see sailors unloading goods, athletes training for the Isthmian Games, politicians making deals, merchants selling idols, and priests leading people into marble temples. Gold coins jingle, perfume hangs in the air, music spills out of taverns, and voices shout in a dozen languages.



This is Corinth — the city where Paul planted a church. For teens living there, temptation lurked on every street corner. Corinth was famous for its wealth, sports, and especially for its immorality. It was a place where fame and pleasure ruled, and where living for Christ was a radical choice.

Sound familiar? Your world may not have marble temples, but it has its own idols — likes, followers, sports glory, and the pressure to fit in. Corinth's temptations mirror today's social media culture, high school hallways, and Friday-night scenes. The good news: the same Jesus who sustained the believers in Corinth can empower you too.

The Church in the Furnace of Corinth

Corinth was a major crossroads of the Roman Empire, rebuilt by Julius Caesar about a century before Paul arrived. With harbors on both sides of the isthmus, it was a trade capital. It also became a moral melting pot. Greek philosophy, Roman law, Eastern mysticism, and every vice imaginable found a home there.

Paul arrived after a rough stretch. In Acts 18 we read he came “in weakness, and in fear, and in much trembling” (1

Corinthians 2:3). He wasn't a celebrity preacher with a travel team and a book deal. He was a scarred missionary who had been beaten, mocked, and chased from city to city. Yet in Corinth, God gave him courage. He met Priscilla and Aquila, worked making tents, and started sharing the gospel.

Within months, a church sprang up — ordinary people rescued out of extraordinary sin. Former idol-worshippers, ex-slaves, merchants, and Roman citizens all gathered to worship Jesus. This was a miracle in a city like Corinth.

Paul begins his letter:

“Unto the church of God which is at Corinth, to them that are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints...” (1 Corinthians 1:2, KJV).

Right away Paul calls them “sanctified” — set apart, holy — even though the rest of the letter will correct their immaturity. Why? Because their identity was not in their past but in Christ.

Sanctified:

Set apart by God and changed by Him to live more like Jesus—cleaned up on the inside and guided to live a life that honors Him.

Key truths for teens:

1. **Identity Comes First.** Before dealing with behavior, Paul affirms their identity. You are “in Christ.” This is the root of everything else.
2. **Unity Is Non-Negotiable.** Corinth’s church was divided by cliques (“I am of Paul,” “I am of Apollos”). Paul insists Jesus is the only foundation (1 Corinthians 3:11).
3. **God Uses Weakness.** Paul didn’t show up with flash; he showed up with faith. God’s power works best in humble vessels.

For a teen today, these truths hit home:

- You’re more than your social media bio.
- Don’t get caught in popularity cliques.
- God can use your small efforts in big ways.

When you think of Corinth, think “hot furnace.” Paul writes like a builder instructing workers: use gold, silver, and precious stones, not wood, hay, and stubble. What survives fire? Not the flashy stuff but what’s solid.

Summary: Called to Be Saints

- **Your Identity:** You belong to Jesus first — not your school, your sports team, your online persona, or your friend group.
- **Your Mission:** Live holy lives in an unholy world, shining like lights in the dark.
- **Your Unity:** Don't let cliques or drama split the body of Christ.
- **Your Hope:** God's power shows up when you feel weak or overlooked.



When Paul called the Corinthians “saints,” he wasn’t flattering them. He was reminding them who they already were in Christ. And that’s what this book — and this session — is about: building a fireproof life and a fireproof church by living out your true identity in Christ.

Application: Building Fireproof Faith

If Corinth were your school:

- Half your friends would be chasing new trends.
- A few would be trying to “go viral” at any cost.
- Some would mock you for your faith.
- Others would secretly hope you’d show them something real.

Paul’s message to you: you’re called to be different – but together.

1. **Living Set Apart.** Being sanctified doesn’t mean acting superior. It means letting Christ shape your choices. Ask: “Will this action survive the fire?”
2. **Unity Over Cliques.** Whether it’s sports teams, social groups, or youth group subgroups, remember Jesus is the foundation. Guard your heart against gossip, jealousy, and competition.
3. **God’s Power in Weakness.** You don’t have to be the loudest Christian on campus. Sometimes the quiet, faithful witness speaks louder than flashy words.

Practical ideas for teens:

- Start your day with Scripture before social media.
- Pray for classmates by name.
- Refuse to spread rumors.
- When pressured to compromise, remember your identity.
- Invite a friend to youth group or church.

When you choose to live fireproof, you're not just protecting yourself. You're becoming a living example to others. In Corinth, the believers' faith turned heads. In your world, it can do the same.

Activities & Discussion

Icebreaker: Show photos of cities like New York or Las Vegas. Ask students: "Where would it be hardest to be a Christian?" Transition: "That's Corinth."

Discussion Questions:

1. What's one way Corinth was like our world today?
2. Why do you think Paul calls them saints before correcting them?
3. What does "building with gold, silver, and precious stones" look like in your life?
4. Where do you feel pressure to fit in at school or online?
5. How could you build unity in your youth group this week?

Group Activity: Corinth Map. Show Corinth on a map of Greece. Highlight the two harbors and temples. Ask: "If you were Paul walking into this city, how would you feel?"

Unity Challenge: This week, intentionally reach out to someone in your group you don't know well. Pray with them or simply encourage them.

Memory Puzzle: Write 1 Corinthians 1:2 on slips of paper (one phrase per slip). Mix them up and have teens put it back in order.

Memory Verse

1 Corinthians 1:2 (KJV):

“Unto the church of God which is at Corinth, to them that are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints...”

Leader’s Note

Talk about what “sanctified” means: set apart for God’s use. Encourage students to memorize it this week.

Prayer

“Lord Jesus, thank You for calling us to be saints in a world that pulls us in every direction. Give us courage like Paul had, unity like the early church, and a love that stands out. Help our lives to be built of things that last forever. In Jesus’ name, Amen.”

Leader's Notes

- **Object Lesson:** Bring two small items — one paper (burns easily), one metal (endures fire). Talk about which one you want your life to resemble.
- **Reinforce Identity:** Teens may feel shame or insecurity. Emphasize Paul starts with identity (“saints”) before behavior.
- **Visual Aids:** A photo of ruins of Corinth or the temple of Apollo.
- **Engagement Tip:** Split students into two teams for verse activities to build excitement and memorization.
